Each Boxing Day a strange ritual takes place in a... creek in a field south of the city of Coventry (UK). At noon the local town mayor launches 1500 bright little yellow plastic ducks into a gently flowing stream, and after a bracing paddle of about 200 metres these tiny yellow plastic ducklings

cross the finishing line in the town's Abbey Fields. Each of these intrepid little flightless babies have numbers painted on their little bottoms and the first four across the line are awarded prizes of £100 (NZ\$195), £75 (NZ\$145), £50 and £25 respectively. (These ever-willing

pocket-sized participants are carefully retrieved, cleaned up & prepared for next year's contest.) This annual duck race has now been running for over 25 years and attracts thousands of enthusiastic punters from all around

Our International President Dr. Jung-Yul Choi comments

"To Lead, we must first ask how we can serve"



Greetings Lions!

"You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." Have you heard this saying? This is supposed to speak to the limits of persuading people to do things that may be good for them.

But I see this differently.

I say, maybe the horse wasn't thirsty.

Maybe the horse was hungry. Or tired. Or maybe he had a sore tooth that needed treatment. Often, when we assume we know what is best for someone, we are wrong.

And then bring it to them.

That is how we all become leaders in change for the world.

WORLD DIABETES DAY, November 14

A timely and welcome partnership

A t'Lions Day with the United Nations' in New York on March 24, 2018, then Lions International President Naresh Aggarwal signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with International Diabetes Federation (IDF) President Professor Nam H. Cho to establish a cooperative alliance in the global fight against diabetes.

The two organisations came together to help prevent diabetes and improve the quality of life for those living with diabetes worldwide.

Working together to achieve a common goal

The signing of the MOU established a partnership that operates at national, regional and global levels. The two organisations agreed to cooperate in good faith to achieve common goals.

IDF President Prof. Nam H. Cho said, "Diabetes is fast becoming a global health emergency. Lions Clubs International is a dynamic movement with a vast and influential network. Our organisations are ideally placed to collaborate and make a difference for the many millions now living with diabetes and all those at risk."

Our dinner cost explained

At a regular dinner meeting members pay \$28 for the two course meal prepared by the DMG kitchen. This figure is established as follows: -

The current net DMG cost of the main & dessert table-served to our Howick Lions members is \$18.70 pp. Add GST to this & the gross cost for our meal is \$21.50 pp.

We then factor in a fixed cost of \$60 for the rental of the Pavilion room for the two meetings we hold each month at Dannemora Gardens (January excepted). This rental fee includes tablecloths, carafes & glasses, crockery & cutlery (supply & clean-up), the urn with hot water, tea, coffee, milk & sugar, the use of all furniture & the AV system, all electricity, limited storage facility, & staff. Assuming a complement of 20 active members, \$3 per Lion per month is levied to cover the space & supplies hire. The meal charge at this point is \$24.50 pp. Our club then adds \$3.50 for visitors, 'incidentals & invisibles' which goes into our administration account; the total now is \$28.00 pp. per month.

Also included in our room rent is the urn, hot water, crockery, tea, coffee, milk & sugar etc at our business meetings; the biscuits are no cost to the club - they are a regular Lion member donation.

We were 17 Lions to this meeting - most coming with ideas & concepts for raising funds, so our Lions club can better serve specific, needy sectors of our community. These ideas of possible action were outlined by each Lion at the end of the meeting & recorded by President Paul. The list was a mix of both new & familiar, and contributors are to be thanked & congratulated for giving effort to this ever-present club issue.

Our club will again approach the Ormiston Station to seek a suitable candidate for an Outward Bound intake next January; a slot for this month has been booked..

Our club Christmas Dinner is in the planning phase & \$100 has been allocated to provide for entertainment.

The Senior's Christmas Lunch is planned for Saturday December 7 and up to \$60 is approved for raffle prizes. Tony is asking for members with suitable vehicles to volunteer to collect guests from various Villages and return them home again. Denis will produce the invitation posters which will go up in the Villages around early/mid November.

Grant advised on the Christmas Lights program. The display will open for one night at 'Midnight Madness' on Friday November 22, then reopen again from December 13 until December 24. A permit has been applied for and Lions are asked to let Grant know who can volunteer for attending during the open display period. A schedule will then be drawn up. One of our gazebos needs repair. There were questions on the role of the members of the Howick Village Association, not only helping with erecting & dismantling the marquee and display, but also assisting with staffing throughout the opening hours. This was not resolved.. With the loss of storage space in the old library building there is concern for finding new space for the tent, Christmas toys & display items.

The meeting was pleased to vote \$250 for LCIF.

Flowers were sent to Karen Sheath with the club's best wishes for a return to good health. And Rex was also noted with best wishes for an improving health status.

A letter received from past member Kersie Khambatta regarding assigning book royalties to Lions in return for converting his recently written children's books to blind facility media will be referred to LCIF.


