

Past District Governor Alan Sheath writes..

David Westwick's service to the Howick and wider community through his involvement with Howick Lions was beyond exceptional. In his over-45 years of membership David was Club Secretary for two terms, Club Treasurer for an unequalled twelve terms and finally he agreed to be President in the Lions Year 2020-2021.

However, these are just numbers and do not give justice to the man. David never wanted to hold high office; he just wanted to get out and serve his community the best way that he could.

David was kind and caring to everyone he met. A man like David is not remembered for his name alone but will be remembered forever by his words and his deeds; by those he touched in his 79 years on this Earth.

David was presented with many awards for his service with the Lions Club of Howick, the pinnacle of which was the presentation of the Lions Clubs International Melvin Jones Fellowship in 2012, the highest individual recognition For Dedicated Humanitarian Service.

Over his 45 years of service with Howick Lions, David performed hundreds of projects but his favourite, and mine, was the cooking and serving of Breakfast at "Camp Quality". Camp Quality is a week-long summer camp for children with life-threatening Cancer. We would arrive as a team at 6.30am at Wesley College and prepare, serve breakfast and wash up for the 100 Children, plus 100 companions, plus staff. This was the most satisfying of projects. David's empathy with the children was amazing.

David's philosophy on cancer, which he bore for eleven years was "It is what it is". In fact, it was David's philosophy on life. In all of my time with David, I never once heard him complain or say Why Me'.

My best friend has gone and the void for me is huge, but the memories are fantastic.

fon Rebecca Bullough, from the Cowies Hill Lions Club in Durban (South Africa) was welcomed back to our Howick Lions club dinner meeting on August 7. Rebecca (club treasurer), has visited us before - catching up with Grandies in Beachlands. Our Shauna also hails from the Durban area in the



Republic, so these two busy Lions had a happy reunion. The Cowies Hill Lions Club will be celebrating their 50 year anniversary next year and currently comprise 20 members. (Below, see the thatched building where the Cowies Hill Lions meet; it's also the administration entrance to the Paradise Valley Nature Reserve located about 35 minutes drive inland from the Durban beachfront). Along the Durban beachfront can regularly be seen vibrantly decorated rickshaws (& pullers), entertaining tourists (since the 1890s) whilst making a Rand or two for a ride or two.



Note the tall masts soaring above this building. These are lightning rods and can be seen far & wide throughout South Africa. They are crucial for protecting the lovely thatched roofs due to the high risk of fire from fierce, not-infrequent (but often short-lived) electrical storms.

A Story for a Season



he year is 1971 and Mike Brooke, president of the Pukekura Lions Club in New Plymouth is searching for a new fundraiser to support his local community. It's not long until Christmas and he really wants to make a difference to those in need. An Englishman by birth, Christmastime brings back fond memories of his mum's homemade Christmas cake - all moist and filled with fruit. Christmas Cakes? Mike realised he might just have an idea

and he knew the right person to help make it happen. Harry, his wife's uncle, was a baker with his own bakery. Recalls Mike: "I talked to Harry and said, how about making some Christmas cakes for the Lions and we'll sell them, and Harry said, yeah I can do that".

"So we got started. Harry baked about 50 and my wife and I were busy wrapping them with a little scrunchy decoration, and they sold in no time. Then other Lions clubs heard we were selling Christmas cakes and I said, Uncle Harry bakes them': and they said they wouldn't mind some".

Sales in that first year were expected to be 50 yet exploded to 500 potential orders for the following year, much to the shock of Mike's uncle-in-law Harry Wilson who knew 500 Christmas cakes was a bit beyond him. Needing more expertise, Mike formed a committee to brainstorm the idea. Members with marketing experience and other talents agreed there was huge potential and three things were apparent. Bake a good quality cake. Package it with Lions Clubs branding. Distribute it via Lions clubs throughout New Zealand.

Baking tenders were sought and Ernest Adams was selected. Ernest Adams developed their own recipe specifically for Lions Christmas Cakes. The tests it had to undergo were; - being cut to ensure it didn't crumble and it had to last for at least two years.

After 45 years, Christmas Cakes coordinator Mike decided it was time to pass the role to someone else and was thrilled when Palmerston North Middle Districts Lion Nelson Speirs picked up the project in 2015. Nelson says they had to gain the approval of the Lions National Executive. "It had to be registered with Lions International in Chicago. LCI need to know what's going on in the name of Lions Clubs around the world."


Nelson reports the venture involves interacting with over 300 other Lions clubs around NZ with about 150-160 clubs actively participating. At its peak about 130,000 cakes were sold each year and it featured as a major item in NZ Lions 50th year celebrations in 2002.

By 2015 sales had dwindled to around 12,000 a year. Last year though, numbers were restricted to 18,000 as Coupland's picked up the role of baker during an investment of infrastructure at its Christchurch bakery. Nelson says before giving Coupland's the contract they did a lot of research into who would be a good choice going forward. "They've been very helpful and the cakes are now out on the market, and the reaction has been excellent."

With every dollar going to charity, millions of dollars has been raised by Lions Christmas cakes over the years.


